

Metamorphoses. Transformations. Changes.

"Roman poet Ovid was born the year after the death of Julius Caesar. He completed the Metamorphoses around the time of the birth of Christ, was later banished for some unknown offence against the Emperor Augustus, and spent the last ten years of his life in exile at Tomis on the Black Sea. In its length and form the poem resembles an epic, but from the very first lines Ovid tells us the different kind of poem he set out to write: an account of how from the beginning of the world right down to his own time bodies had been magically changed, by the power of the

gods, into other bodies." -- poet Ted Hughes

The Greek and Roman myths Ovid set down had been floating in the collective memory of Mediterranean peasants, farmers and fishermen for hundreds of years before he put them into verse. Myths really are the earliest form of science, our attempts to satisfy the deeply human curiosity about how we got here, and why the world is as it is. There is great calming power in understanding why we have seasons, earthquakes, gentle halcyon winds... Who among us, if we lived 2000 years ago, would not look at our hurricanes, tsunamis, droughts and diseases and not think they must result from behavior of the capricious and often disdainful gods of Mount Olympus.

Playwright and director Mary Zimmerman selected a few of Ovid,s myths for a theatrical treatment which first opened just days after the 9/11 tragedy in 2001. Though she changed nothing of the piece to acknowledge the calamity, there were many moments in the play which had new resonance, including a dying man whose only prayer is that his body be found by his wife.

Just by walking into a theatre we take the risk of being changed. By bringing a willingness to believe for a short time that teenagers are kings, queens, and gods an audience member makes him or herself open to the possibility of transformation. We come to the theatre to go on a journey: not only to distant times and places but to new feelings as well. To believe that even in a world where there is danger and malevolence, carelessness and inequality there is also redemption and forgiveness; there is love and there is simple beauty. Remember how apples smell?
